Execution of an Amendment to the Architectural Design Service Contract with DTW Architects and Planners, Ltd. for the Administration Building Renovations Project No.: DC 137

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to authorize the County Manager to amend the Contract for Architectural Design Services with DTW Architects and Planners, Ltd. of Durham to provide additional architectural services for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) certification and additional structural design services for the Durham County Administration Building, located at 200 East Main Street, Durham, in the amount of \$65,000, thus totaling a not to exceed amount of \$786,000 (See Attachment 1, Pages 1 & 2)

LEED certification fees were omitted from the original design proposal due to oversight. This amendment includes design services to achieve LEED certification for the project. LEED Commissioning services are not included in this amendment and will be performed by an independent commissioning agent per LEED guidelines. The additional structural design fee is due to unanticipated correctional work needed on the existing structure.

Funds for the Architectural Design Services for this project were approved by the BOCC on February 12, 2018. Minority and Women-Owned Business Enterprises (M/WBE) participation proposed by the project team, including this amendment, is approximately 48.2 percent, significantly exceeding the general County aspirational goal of 25 percent MWBE participation (Attachment 1, p. 2).

It is recommended that the County proceed with all work described in the proposal dated January 11, 2018, and revised October 8, 2018. Funding for the architectural design contract is available in the Administration Building Renovation Capital Project Account.

customer service.

18-1143 **Approval of a Lease Agreement for 309 Crutchfield Street Between the County of Durham and Alliance Behavioral Healthcare**

Agenda Text: The Board is requested to approve the attached Lease Agreement for 309 Crutchfield Street to Alliance Behavioral Health Care and authorize the County Manger to execute the attached Lease Agreement. The property is the location for Durham's crisis center, which is now called the Recovery Response Center (formerly known as the "Durham Center Access").

Alliance Behavioral Healthcare provides mental health, developmental disabilities, and substance abuse (MH/DD/SA) services as the Area Authority in the Durham, Wake, Johnston and Cumberland County catchment area. Alliance subleases this property to Recovery Innovations, Inc., the current non-profit provider that operates the Recovery Response Center under contract with Alliance. The lease specifically allows Alliance to sublease the property for this purpose with the County's permission. Alliance has leased this facility from Durham County since 2012 when they were spun off from Durham County during the state's mental health reform.

Alliance is in the process of renovating portions of the building, investing approximately \$1.5 million in upgrades to enhance the overall efficiency and use of the building as a walk-in crisis facility for the community. This investment warrants a longer lease term, and staff recommends the proposed lease term of January 1, 2019 through June 30, 2023. This lease term also allows the County and Alliance to align future lease terms with the fiscal year.

Alignment With Strategic Plan: This lease agreement supports Goal 2: Health and Well-being for All.

18-1156 **Capital Project Amendment No. 19CPA000009 - Appropriating \$3,200,000 of Limited Obligation Bonds (LOBS) Funding to the Administration Building II Renovation Capital Project and Execution of Contract Amendment with Whiting-Turner Contracting Company (WTCC)/Holt Brothers, Inc. for the 7th Floor Upfit of the Durham County Administration Building II Renovation (former Judicial Building) Project No.: 4730DC073**

Agenda Text: The Board is requested to approve the Capital Project Amendment No. 19CPA000009 appropriating \$3,200,000 into the Administration Building II Renovation Capital Project Account and to authorize the County Manager to execute the Contract Amendment for an additional \$2,957,607 (base bid) plus owner's contingency at \$88,728 for the 7th Floor up-fit which brings the total Guaranteed Maximum Price Contract amount not to exceed \$42,295,005 for the overall construction project of the Administration Building II Renovation (former Judicial Building) located on 201 East Main Street (See Attachment 1, pages 1-11).

The renovation project achieved substantial completion on August 31, 2018 and previously included modifications to the ground and floors 1-6, leaving the 7th floor as unassigned space for future upfits. However, during the programming efforts for the Administration Building (200 East Main Street) it was determined that an additional department needed to be relocated from that facility in order to allow growth/expansion of the departments to remain in the facility once Register of Deeds and Tax Administration moved out. Through discussions with the BOCC, the Manager's Office and the design team it was determined that the 7th Floor should be up-fitted for use by the Finance Department. The decision to upfit the space takes advantage of having the design and construction teams currently familiar with the facility. This lends itself to potential cost savings of not having to bid a new project but rather extending the services of the current design and construction teams already on the project. This will minimize durations for shop drawing reviews and approvals and will be beneficial with the warranties and long-term maintenance of the facility reducing contractor call-backs and finger-pointing of maintenance responsibilities. The design was finalized, and bids were received on November 16, 2018.

This amendment includes the additional C, M @ R services necessary for the 7th floor up-fit for use by the Finance Department maintaining the design intent of the

original project. It is recommended that the County proceed with all work described in the proposal dated November 16, 2018 in the amount of \$2,957,607. For Minority and Women-Owned Business Enterprises (M/WBE) participation information (See Attachment 2, Page 1). Funding for this amendment is pending approval of the Capital Project Amendment.

Alignment with Strategic Plan: This aligns with Goal 4: Environmental Stewardship - through the improvement of the environmental performance of County buildings to reduce energy use and greenhouse gas emissions from the built environment. The relocation of various departments into this facility also addresses Goal 5: by providing more efficient service delivery and better customer service.

Budget Ordinance Amendment No.19BCC000020 to Recognize Grant funds in the Amount of \$2,000 from Shift NC "All Together Now" Award for the Youth Home

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No.19BCC000020 to recognize \$2,000 from Shift NC "All Together Now" for the Youth Home. The Youth Home received the first installation award in May of 2016 (Fiscal Year 2015-16). These funds are a continuation of the original grant award.

The project will help build and strengthen a referral network to link young people to quality care. The funds will be used to purchase materials to educate youth on health lifestyles.

18-1141 **Approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 19BCC000022 Reducing the General Fund Budget for the Payment of Three Fire Trucks Ordered in Fiscal Year (FY) 2018 Because These Trucks are now Being paid for in the LOBs Capital Project Fund (Fund #4004110000) in FY2019 with Debt Issuance Proceeds**

Agenda Text: The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 19BCC000022 reducing the General Fund FY2019 budget for the payment of three fire trucks ordered in FY2018 because these trucks are now being paid for in the LOBs Capital Project Fund (Fund #4004110000) in FY2019 with debt issuance proceeds in an amount not to exceed \$1.5M.

The Board approved the contract to purchase these three fire trucks in a regular session Board meeting on October 9, 2017 (Agenda Item #17-0387). Originally, the three fire trucks were to be purchased in the General Fund with funding sources to be a combination of a transfer of funds from the Durham County Fire and Rescue (DCF&R) Service District Fund in the amount of \$398,873 and the issuance of installment purchase proceeds for the General Fund in the amount of \$1,023,830 for a total purchase price of \$1,422,703 with these three fire trucks being the collateral for the issuance. As such, the encumbrance (e.g. purchase order) when the three trucks were ordered was accounted for in the General Fund. The trucks were not received in FY2018. As a result, the encumbrance rolled forward to FY2019 in the General Fund in the amount of \$1,422,703 (including the roll forward budget) for payment of these trucks once received. At the time of the order, there was no executed agreement between the County and the City of Durham to provide the services for the DCF&R District. Included in the executed agreement with the City which was effective July 1, 2018 is the transfer of these trucks to the City once received and paid for by the County. Because the County will not hold title to these assets after receipt and payment in full to the vendor, the County cannot use these trucks as collateral on debt proceeds issued to assist in funding the purchase which is why the purchase of these vehicles was added to the September 2018 debt issuance where the financing was secured by the Administration Building II.

As a result, the funding source for the purchase of these trucks had to change from

what was originally proposed and approved. Please note that the DCF&R Fund could not support the entire payment upon receipt of the vehicles. Therefore, the Board approved in the final resolution for the debt issuance that occurred in September of 2018 an amount not to exceed \$1.5M for the purchase of these trucks including the equipment necessary for these trucks to be put into service upon receipt. The final resolution for the debt issuance was approved by the Board at the regular session meeting held on August 13, 2018 (Agenda Item #18-0935). As a result, the encumbrance (e.g. purchase order) will be reassigned to the LOBs Capital Project Fund (Fund #4004110000). Because the funding source for these three trucks changed, and the expenditure for the purchase of these trucks will not be accounted for in the General Fund, County staff are requesting approval of the Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 19BCC000022 reducing the General Fund budget by the amount that rolled forward (\$1,422,703). By approving this amendment, the FY2019 General Fund budget will realistically reflect what is authorized to be spent for FY2019 in the General Fund.

Also, please note that the funding source for the debt service for the financing of the firefighting vehicles will be the DCF&R Service Tax Fund. An annual amount is to be transferred from the DCF&R Service Tax Fund to the Debt Service Fund to fund the portion of the debt service for these trucks. No general fund monies will fund this portion of the debt service.

A request for proposals (RFP) for construction services for this work was advertised on October 8, 2018 and Bids were received on October 22, 2018. One response was received. The project was re-bid on October 31, 2018. One response was received from C.T. Wilson Construction in the amount of \$1,078,747. Value Engineering efforts were undertaken, and the proposed contract amount was reduced by \$177,261 for a total contract proposal amount of \$901,486. For Minority and Women-Owned Business Enterprises (M/WBE) participation information (See Attachment 1, page 17).

The Engineering Department has reviewed the bid response and subsequent Value Engineering options with Purchasing and Detention Center Staff and recommends that the County award a contract to C.T. The County Manager recommends that the Board approve the attached Donation Agreement between Durham County and GoTriangle and authorize the County Manager to execute same. GoTriangle has requested that Durham County execute the attached Donation Agreement (Attachment 1) to donate a permanent easement and a temporary construction easement to facilitate the construction, operation and maintenance of the planned Durham-Orange Light Rail Transit System (D-OLRT). The Board previously approved the donation of land for these purposes in a Memorandum of Understanding between GoTriangle and Durham County in January 2017 (Attachment 2).

The easements are requested on the County Detention Center property, generally located on the south side of Pettigrew Street from the corner of South Mangum Street to Roxboro Road, and along the east side of South Mangum Street from the corner at Pettigrew Street to the area near the main entrance of the Detention Facility. The proposed permanent easement consists of approximately 392 square feet, and the temporary construction easement totals approximately 9,932 square feet. The easement area and sizes are estimated at this time based on engineering plans still in development by GoTriangle and are shown on a map provided by GoTriangle included with the donation agreement. The precise location and size of the easement will not be known until the final design is complete. At the completion of final design documents, GoTriangle will obtain a survey, and the legal description from the survey will be included in the instrument(s) granting the easements to GoTriangle. The donation agreement commits that the easement is to be executed on or before December 31, 2019. The value of the proposed easements is \$282,825, per an appraisal obtained by GoTriangle dated September 20, 2018.

State law funding for the D-OLRT requires that all non-Federal and non-State funding be committed by April 30, 2019. Likewise, under Go Triangle's schedule with FTA, they need to demonstrate to FTA the commitment of all local funding sources (including in-kind and real estate) in the first quarter of 2019. Real estate donations by local entities qualifies as local funding. The County's commitment to donate the easement is documented by the Donation Agreement, but the actual conveyances are not anticipated until GoTriangle is assured of receiving the federal award later in 2019. The final easements will be brought back for Board approval when they are ready to be executed.
